 - 1.1.2 Explain the concept *apartheid* in your own words. (1x2) (2)
 - 1.1.3 Explain why black resistance was united against Botha's government. (2x2) (4)
 - 1.1.4 Comment on the reason why Botha's reforms were seen as 'merely cosmetic'. (1x2) (2)
- 1.2 Use Source 1B.
 - 1.2.1 From the source identify THREE houses of parliament that resulted from Botha's reforms. (3x1) (3)
 - 1.2.2 Explain the messages that are conveyed in the cartoon. Use the visual clues in the source to support your answer. (2x2) (4)
- 1.3 Refer to Source 1C
 - 1.3.1 What is implied by the statement' We are here to say that there are rights that are neither conferred by nor derived from the State' (2x2) (4)
 - 1.3.2 Comment on the determination and intentions of black people at different levels to challenging apartheid? (2x2) (4)
 - 1.3.3 Comment on the usefulness of this Source to a historian researching the UDF's reaction to Botha's tri-cameral parliament. (2X2) (4)

 - 1.4.3 Using information from the source and our own knowledge, explain De Klerk's reaction to the voter's turnout. (2x2) (4)
- 1.5 Study Sources 1B and 1D. Explain how the information in both sources supports each other regarding the representation of different race groups in Botha's tricameral parliament. (2x2) (4)
- Using the information in the relevant sources and your own knowledge, write a paragraph of about EIGHT lines (about 80 words) explaining why South Africans rejected the political reforms that were introduced by President PW Botha in the 1980s.

 - 2.1.4 Explain the role that the media played towards the success of the TRC. (2x2) (4)
- 2.2 Refer to Source 2B.
 - 2.2.1 Explain the messages that are conveyed in the cartoon. (2x2) (4)
 - 2.2.2 Comment on the usefulness of this source to a historian researching on the reason for the establishment of the TRC. (2x2) (4)
- 2.3 Study Source 2A and 2B. Explain how the information in Source 2A supports the evidence in Source 2₽ regarding the challenges that the TRC faced in its mission. (2x2) (4)
- 2.4 Use Source 2C.
 - 2.4.1 According to Matamela Dladlamba, why was it shocking that Tshifhiwa Muofhe was associated with the bombing of the Sibasa police station?(2x1) (2)
 - 2.4.2 Explain what you think is implied by the statement, 'she could not understand why her son was singled out in the context of being targeted by police officers. (2x2) (4)
 - 2.4.3 Name TWO Lutheran church ministers who were detained for bombing Sibasa police station. (2x1) (2)

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- 2.4.4 How, according to the source did the police violate the human rights of the detainees? Name TWO ways. (2x1) (2)
- 2.5 Use Source 2D
 - 2.5.1 Why according to Ramaligela, did the police interrogate the victims? (2x1) (2)
 - 2.5.2 Define the concept *amnesty* in the context of the TRC. (1x2) (2)
 - 2.5.3 Explain the implication of Judge Khampepe's question, 'Why did you have to say that in your application form knowing that you are applying for amnesty and the primary condition for satisfying the granting of amnesty is that you must tell the truth?'
